Lamorinda Village goes live!

On Monday, April 6, Lamorinda Village capped off three years of planning with a joyful launch event at the Lafayette Orinda Presbyterian Church. The Village is now in active operation, with more than 100 members, 50+ volunteers to serve them, and a growing roster of screened local businesses to handle member needs that go beyond the volunteer range.

More than 250 people attended the launch celebration, where they checked out the services of some of our Preferred Service Providers, enjoyed refreshments and getting to know one another, and learned more about how the Village can support them in remaining safe and independent in their homes.

Village President Ruth McCahan and Executive Director Anne Ornelas accepted proclamations congratulating Lamorinda Village on its grand opening from Catharine Baker, Assemblymember, 16th Assembly District, and the local Chambers of Commerce.

Village volunteers circulated with a survey to determine the kinds of educational, cultural, and social programs our members would like to engage in, from health and wellness programs to book discussions and travel to local points of interest.

The Programs committee is hard at work organizing member events with our Strategic Partners Saint Mary's College and the three local libraries, while hosting monthly meet-and-greet events for members. They will be publicizing events and new interest groups through member mail and email, the newsletter, and the calendar on our website (www.lamorindavillage.org).

Why Join Lamorinda Village?

We often ask members and visitors why they are interested in the Village. Here are two of their answers:

From an attendee at our launch event: "I am really excited about the educational events you will be having. A lot of my friends have passed on and I just don't get out as much as I used to. This will give me a chance to build new friendships and keep active."

From a guest at a Village living room chat: "In this model the community becomes the source of "screening" [businesses that we might use] because we have confidence in each other."

Tools You Can Use

The Orinda Police Department has published a "Do-It-Yourself Home Safety" information pamphlet, available on the City of Orinda website at the Police Department page at www.cityoforinda.org or you can pick up a copy at City Hall. The pamphlet provides advice on a variety of safety topics including: Home security, doors, windows, locks, lighting, alarms, neighborhood watch programs, identity theft, auto burglary prevention, personal safety for adults and children, fire safety, calling 9-1-1 and the methods police use to communicate with the community.

Did you know?

The median cost of nursing home care in the U.S. is now more than \$91,000, according to the annual "Cost of Care" report from Genworth Financial. One year in an assisted living facility runs \$43,200, and a year of visits from an agency home health aide is \$45,760. Genworth surveyed 15,000 nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and other providers across the country in January and February to develop these median cost figures.
